I love the localised curriculum in Merivale, I love that these children feel proud of who they are, I love that the whānau feel proud of Merivale, I love that the whānau come in, I love that I don't need to be the person that speaks for this kura now, that they will get up, and they will be excited about the journey that we have been on. I love that the children are just so excited to be here. They don't see themselves as being the only decile one school, they see themselves as being a part of an amazing journey and they feel proud of who they are and I'm just so proud of that and where the school has come from and where we are going to.
